Pastoral Letter

His disciples asked him, “Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?” Jesus answered, “Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God’s works might be revealed in him.

Following the question and answer session Jesus spit on the ground, made mud, put it on the man’s eyes, and sent him to a water source to clean his eyes. The man’s sight was restored, but the story didn’t end there. People couldn’t believe that this was the blind man they knew. They apparently didn’t like the new-seeing man, because they reported him to the authorities, who in turn question him and rejected him and his new vision.

Jesus maintained that the man’s blindness allowed for God’s works to be revealed. We have always interpreted this through the lens of the miraculous healing powers of God. But there is more to being blind than a physical disability. People with 20/20 vision can often not see the forest because of the trees.

For far too long Blacks, people of color, in our country have tried to get the world to see and understand racism. In her book, White Fragility, Robin DiAngelo focuses on how Whites become so defensive, when the conversation focuses on White privilege. She tells us racism and White privilege are not our personal sins. It is a systemic problem into which we have been born; a problem we need to address. Whites, the privileged, in our country have been willing to try to be nicer to Blacks, even laws have been passed to try to make available equal access to goods and services White citizens take for granted, but Whites have, for the most part, been blind to the deeply rooted systemic and structural racism of our country and our world. I know I certainly have been.

In recent years books, documentaries, podcasts, even seminars trying to educate our society about the nature and origins of racism have been springing up in abundance. Thanks to guidance from Dr. Bonita Cade I was able to share with you a small list of these resources, hoping to begin to heal our blindness to the sea of systemic racism we all swim in. Through my reading and listening I feel that my vision is beginning to clear. I see, understand many things much better. I now know that understanding systemic racism and working for racial justice is a life-long journey, requiring me to be constantly vigilant, listen attentively, and be willing to challenge my prejudices.

As I have stated in other missives, it is not the job of Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) to educate me, or us. We must do the work ourselves. This fall Amicable Church will offer several ways for us, as individuals and as a congregation, to do the hard work of healing our blindness. I am offering to lead a

Worship Themes

September 6 Labor Day Weekend. This is a time to lift up the importance of labor and how work helps us to find meaning in life. In the midst of these difficult economic times, when so many people are trying to find work, we will lift up the gift of our thrift store, those who work so hard to make it successful, and how it seeks to serve those struggling to make ends meet.

September 13 Rally Day Sunday. In pre-COVID times this Sunday would mark the start of our fall church school programming. In our virtual world we will be talking about the importance of Sunday School as a part of our larger plan for faith formation. In worship we hope to hear from our children and youth, our teachers, and other adults about faith formation in a time of social distancing.

September 20 On our denominational calendar this Sunday is listed as **Just Peace Sunday**. Traditionally half of the moneys raised through our NIN offering goes to support the large ministry our denomination has among Native Americans, especially in the western half of our country.

What Is Whiteness?

Amicable’s Faith Formation Team has organized a two-part seminar called “What Is Whiteness?” to be held on Zoom. The first part is a 90-minute presentation on how racism was built into the structure of our society over the past 400 years. The second part will be a chance for participants to talk about what we heard in the first session and reflect on how we might affect positive change in our lives and our community in the face of such a monumental, seemingly intractable social structure.

The facilitator will be Aimee Davidson from the YWCA of Providence. The first 90-minute Zoom session will be on Monday, October 5, from 7:00 – 8:30 PM. The second session will be on Monday, October 26, from 7:00 – 8:30 PM.

A Four-Part Conversation on Racial Justice



Financial Notes of Interest – August 2020

- Due to the Stock Market fluctuations & continued market uncertainty caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the withdrawals from Amicable's General Endowment and Special Endowment funds planned for the 2nd and 3rd quarters of this year are not being taken. Instead, holdings in Amicable's BankNewport checking & savings accounts are being used. To help cover this Endowment Fund income loss, Amicable applied for & obtained a PPP (Paycheck Protection Program) SBA loan for \$24,100. These funds will be used primarily for payments of employee salary, wages, and benefits over the 8 week period from April 22 through June 16. When used in this manner the loan will essentially be turned into a grant with no need for repayment.
- Changes were made and approved by the Government (House, Senate, President) to the PPP SBA Loan requirements and process in early June, as well as in July, with additional updates being considered, so the application process for obtaining loan forgiveness has again been delayed until at least the end of September.
- July & August contribution receipts were fairly typical, & we remain a little ahead of the plan.
- The postponed 5K Race Event is still planned for early September (virtual).
- In lieu of our normal Summer Festival, a yard sale was held on Saturday August 29th, and there are some preliminary discussions for some forms of auction activities for the fall.
- However, the December Holiday Bazaar is unlikely to occur, although some components may be attempted.
- The Thrift Shop finally opened again in June, under Covid19 protocol, and had an average month of income in June along with two very good income months in July and August; even enough to make up for the lost income from April and May.
- The budgeted repair & repainting of the Sanctuary ceiling has been postponed until 2021, and other ways to limit standard expenses are under discussion. With the church building closed, utility, cleaning, and supply expenses are lower than planned.
- It is quite difficult at this point to predict an end-of-year Operation Account position with such a crazy year of change. It is even possible to end up the year with a surplus, although if that looks likely, the Board of Trustees is already discussing the possibility of not taking the planned 4th Quarter General Endowment withdrawal so as to end the year in a more budget-neutral position, while also preserving the General Endowment Fund's market value.
