

Pastoral Letter

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them.

Last Sunday was Palm Sunday, the beginning of the most important week in the Christian faith. Like so many of you I am truly going to miss coming together and celebrating with my faith family the truths of our faith and our life together that Holy Week represents. But, maybe the gift of Holy Week this year is that we cannot do "the usual". I know my own quarantine and sheltering in place and physical distancing, along with my church building locked up on lock down, is forcing me to look at Holy Week differently.

In the pageantry of 2,000 years of developing liturgy and traditions it is possible that some of us have put Holy Week in a bottle to preserve and treasure it. Palm Sunday with its processions, children waving palms or branches or flowers. Parades carrying statues. Hymns and anthems. What a party! Was Jesus in a party mood, knowing what was coming? Are we, today, maybe missing something?

This can be asked of some of our other days. Maundy Thursday with its washing of feet and a shared meal that includes broken bread and cups of wine, followed by the emptying of the church of all adornments. Good Friday, with stations of the cross in some churches and the extinguishing of candles and lights in most. Holy Saturday, or the Great Vigil of Easter, going from darkness into bringing in the light. And then there is Easter Sunday itself. All lilies and spring flowers and candles and organ with trumpets playing music in a major key, and full churches.

Oh, how I love all of this and, yet, looking at it now, it seems such a relic; something to be hung on a wall, like a photograph, to remind us of a wonderful past. Holy Week is supposed to be about universal human truths, "God" truths. Maybe, just maybe, with our world turned upside down, we are prepared to allow Holy Week to shed its wonderful traditions and speak to us in our present-day consternations.

One of the outstanding stories of Holy Week is Jesus "cleansing" the temple. How horrendous is it that some people hoarded things like hand sanitizers, just to sell them at extortionist prices? What is forgotten, often, in the cleansing of the temple story is what Jesus did after that. He taught in the temple. He did more than condemn the love of money, he taught a better way. As upset as I am by those cashing in on this pandemic, I am even more comforted by the sacrifice of so many; and by the kindness and support and love people are showing everywhere.

Maundy Thursday, with its focus on foot-washing and bread-breaking, takes on new meaning as we find ourselves handwashing and very careful about touching other people's food. If we are only washing our hands in order to keep the virus from our faces, we are missing the story of Holy Week. We wash our hands, because we do not want our neighbor to be

infected. We physically distance ourselves out of respect for our neighbor. As important as communion (Eucharist or The Lord's Supper) as a community act is, more important is our remembering the one who gave his very life that we might know of God's love. So, those who today are on the front lines, filling bags with food for those who have none, while doing it at a safe distance, they are the ones sharing the bread of life and the cup of salvation.

Good Friday this year, around the world, will be more real, more visceral than ever. How many people are suffering the loss of a loved one, due to Covid-19? And, how many are having to wait to tend to their loved one's body until another day? How many are living with the pain of having to choose who gets a life-saving respirator and who doesn't? How many are not allowed in the hospital to be with their loved one on a respirator, hovering between life and death? Do we not begin to understand Mother Mary as she stood at a distance and watched?

The Great Vigil of Easter, my favorite service of the year, because all too often I find my faith caught between the cross and the resurrection, waiting. Waiting is probably a very good description of this year's Holy Week. Will I get the virus? Will there be a job to go back to? If I don't graduate this spring, what do I do next fall? There are just so many unknowns in the face of so much loss! We sit, isolated, just like Jesus' disciples. In my lifetime I have never felt so close to the disciples on that Holy Saturday than I do in these days.

What are we to do? The easy and difficult answer to this great unknown is Easter. The truth is not going to descend a week from tomorrow. Easter Sunday is just a reminder of how God has brought life back from the dead; filled people in darkness with light and hope. In our impatience with the great unknowns we face, we forget that the disciples' experience of the resurrection was not instantaneous. It took a while, and several visits from Jesus, before they moved from isolation and sheltering in place to new life. In church tradition that new life happened at Pentecost. 50 days after Easter. So, maybe this year's Easter in our lives may be a little bit more like Easter the followers of Jesus experienced. Hunkered down, keeping their distance from the world, wondering what the stories circulating among the followers were all about; wondering whether the stories were true.

This is the story of the Christian faith. In the panic of this pandemic what do you believe? Is resurrection possible? Will we get beyond our greed, cleanse our temple, and seek to serve those in need? Are we willing to sit with the suffering Christ found in our ill or unemployed neighbor? Shut away, distancing and sheltering in place, are we willing to look out the window, see the beauty of spring and choose to hope and to love?

I encourage you to choose Easter!

Wishing you an experience of the Spirit, as we, together, journey to Easter.

Amicable News at a Glance

Trustees: The Trustees have developed a COVID-19 Preparedness document with recommendations as to building security and expense management during this challenging time. Please see details below under Church Council.

Church Council:

The Church Council met virtually using the Zoom application on Wednesday, April 1, 2020.

The agenda included:

1. Approval of March Meeting Minutes
2. Group Debrief
3. COVID-19 Preparedness Document
4. Stewardship in the Time of COVID-19
5. Pending Issues/Updates
 - a. Coordination of Annual Giving Opportunities and Annual Time/Talent/Mission Opportunities lists with the Website and Facebook
 - b. Donation Policy Dissemination and Oversight
 - c. Volunteerism Promotion – how and who
 - d. Fundraising Efforts - identify a small group to hold a "post-mortem" review/report of 2019 fundraising efforts/events to date
 - e. Messy Church - identify a small group to provide a plan/report for next steps
 - f. Concert Proposal – Ted Baer and guest – Update

The COVID-19 Preparedness Document recommendations were approved unanimously by the Church Council.

The highlights of the document are as follows:

Amicable COVID-19 Plan of Preparedness

Assumptions

1. Anticipate that members or friends of the congregation will develop or be impacted by the COVID-19 virus.
 - a. Request that members and friends self-disclose COVID-19 exposures to our Minister to allow the church community to support them in whatever manner possible.
2. Create plan to limit building access to critical personnel only.
3. Decision making should take place at the Church Council level.
4. Trustees as parties responsible for oversight of church property and assets will craft a plan for Church Council approval that will be ready for distribution by Friday, 3/27/2020.
5. Meetings will continue virtually using Zoom application (or similar capability).
6. Create “core group” of church volunteers to provide church

oversight during this period.

7. Convene Church Council meetings every two weeks via Zoom (or similar capability).

Plan

1. Building Access and Security

- a. Eliminate automatic locking and unlocking of North Lobby and Courtyard doors. Building will remain locked with access only by authorized staff.
- b. Lock Sanctuary and Upper Hall areas to limit areas that require sanitizing. Close off all classroom spaces. Sanitize and close off bathrooms. Leaving one for use.
- c. Suspending non-critical activities such as Life, Inc and Ken Stubbs, Custodian.
- d. Continuing regulatory activities such as NWSI (water testing for DOH submission) and Landscaping activities to preserve properties' appearance and value.
- e. Suggesting work arounds for continued congregational communication – how to best leverage Kathy, Church Secretary, remotely.
- f. Communicate to members via webpage, Facebook, Friendly Messenger and email blast any Church Council decisions.
 - i. Delay distribution of April Friendly Messenger to capture decisions taken at Church Council meeting on 4/1/2020.

2. Core Group

- a. Which roles need access to the building?
 - i. Minister
 - ii. Treasurer
 - iii. Moderator
 - iv. Standing Committee chair
 - v. Trustee Chair

Thrift Shop Volunteers (3)

- vi. Core Group personnel are not to enter building w/o an explicit supporting purpose and not if they have any reason to suspect that they have even possibly been exposed to COVID-19.
- b. Ask Core Group members to assist with limited housekeeping and office tasks to include mail collection, trash and recycling, building security until COVID-19 situation normalized.
- c. Such duties and assignments will be documented and maintained by the Core Group.
 - i. A Core Group member may recommend to the Core Group other church members who might be helpful in building maintenance and support activities. The Core Group will discuss and decide on authorizing any such recommendations.

3. Amicable's Financial View for 2020: Operation Account

- a. Based on the 2020 Operation Account's budget, funds were

- **PLEASE NOTE:** In order to facilitate smooth edits from video to video, please allow a few seconds of dead space at the beginning and end of the video.

to be withdrawn from the General Endowment Fund on a quarterly basis, at the beginning of March, June, September, and December.

- b. The March amount of \$26,196.50 has already been withdrawn.
- c. Due to the serious downturn in the Stock Market, further withdrawals this year are discouraged unless a quick market rebound takes place.
- d. Need to manage our current cash holdings (bank accounts) without any further endowment withdrawals; and look at methods to stretch cash holdings through the end of 2020.
- e. Under the current Operation Account 2020 income and expense plan, without taking the remaining three endowment withdrawals, at the end of December we will be about \$19,000 short of funds. This deficit includes our loan payments for the Accessibility Project.
- f. If income from contributions, donations, and fund-raising events doesn't meet what is planned, we will even be shorter of funds. Already the 5K Race is being postponed – hopefully to later this year. There are concerns about holding the Summer Festival at the end of June, maybe postponed a month or two. The Thrift Shop will lose income, being at least a month not opened, maybe two (or more).
- g. Planned expenses must be reviewed and those that we can lessen or postpone until next year must be considered.
 - i. An obvious one is to delay the \$11,400 repair/repainting of the Sanctuary ceiling until 2021.
 - ii. The Trustees are looking at other specific expenses which might be postponed or lessened in some manner, such as weekly periodic tasks/expenses that won't be necessary while the church is closed. Church closure and maintaining low heating will also lessen electricity and oil usage costs.
 - iii. Depending on the length of the shutdown staff salaries may have to be reduced.
- h. Trustees will develop a pro forma austerity budget for discussion at the Church Council meeting scheduled for Wednesday, April 15, 2020.

Polio Epidemic of 1952-54 (My Memory)

I must have been about seven that summer of 1954 when I was spending a few days with my Grandmother who lived on Riverside drive just past the railroad bridge up on the hill. My cousin Rita, a year or so older than I, was there too. Rita was my favorite cousin and we had great fun exploring the neighborhood and swimming at what I now realize was a tiny beach just

down the wooden stairs and across the narrow road. We had to wait one hour after lunch before going in the water as it was believed that any sooner and we would get stomach cramps and drown. But that summer the fear of drowning was eclipsed by the fear of polio.

We all had had, or would get, measles, chicken pox and maybe mumps. While these all might cause serious problems, they were an expected part of childhood. Full recovery was also expected. But polio, polio was different. Also called infantile paralysis it seemed to our parents that we, their children, were in particular peril. Still Dr. VonTrapp's wife in Adamsville had been stricken and of course the late President Roosevelt had too. They each spent the rest of their life wheelchair dependent. We weren't quite sure how it was spread and movie theaters, swimming pools, sleepover camp and so many places where people, especially children, might gather were closed. And then the girl who had sat next to me in Sunday School class just a few weeks earlier had it.

So I can still see my grandmother sitting on a chair by the phone and calling my mother. "Nina" she said, "Martha has a stiff neck." My mother must have flown that three miles or so to pick me up and take me straight to Dr. Lent's office. We didn't even go home to get cleaned up, the usual requirement before a doctor visit. A stiff neck could mean polio. The specter of the Iron Lung, heavy metal leg braces, lifelong paralysis and death stalked us all those summers. Each summer in the United States there were tens of thousands of cases every summer, thousands were paralyzed, thousands died.

I didn't have polio. I was lucky. The doctor put his hands around my head and lifted me off the floor thereby straightening out my neck. My mother cried. She was lucky too.

The next Spring, we all lined up in the basement of Fort Barton School to get our "polio shots". Dot Brooks was one of the nurses who volunteered to inoculate us. Just as now so many medical professionals are stepping us to be of service.

For so many of us of our generation, our current health crisis reminds us of the most feared disease of our childhoods.

How to Support Amicable Now **Help Amicable Continue its Ministry and Outreach**

Dear Amicable Pledgers & Contributors,

I've received a few inquiries about ways to send any contributions to Amicable during our period of the building being closed and with no on-site services.

First of course, is to just mail in any donation to the church. Just indicate in the check memo line, or a note, how you want your contribution applied.

If you leave the memo line blank:

- if you have pledged this year it will automatically be applied according to your pledge,
- otherwise, it will be applied to the Operation and Benevolence Accounts in a 90/10 ratio.

If you already do on-line banking thru your bank, you should be able to have the bank mail a check to the church, and you should be able to add a "memo line" note to the check if you want (see above about a blank memo line).

If you use BankNewport then you can even set up an account-to-account transfer from your BankNewport account to Amicable's BankNewport account; there is no charge for this. If you are interested in doing this, please give me a call (624-2323) and I'll give you Amicable's account number and walk you through the process.
