Pastoral Letter

For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.

Last year, in this space, I shared with you two testimonials, which were presented in worship in October 2018. I am repeating this again, as I have heard from several people of their interest in reading Sue Cory's testimonial.

So, as we look forward to the new year, trusting in God to "give [us] a future with hope", instead of me writing about the coming year and the hope I perceive on the horizon, here is a testimonial that reflects a bit on Amicable's past, which always steadies and guides us into "a future with hope":

Sue Cory wrote:

I love Amicable Church. With the exception of my family and childhood friends, nearly all the people I love most are my Amicable family. They have been with me and my family through many difficult times, and through happy times, as well. As I have gotten older, I find I am very emotional about Amicable Church, and therefore I am not standing before you to read this.

Unlike several members of our congregation who have found a home here at Amicable after growing up in other faith traditions, I have always been a Congregationalist. Although my maternal grandparents lived at the bottom of Highland Road and attended Amicable, I grew up in East Providence and attended Hope Congregational. If I was spending time with my grandparents, I came to church with them, sitting in the pew where Jim and Ray usually sit. My favorite memories of Amicable are hearing my grandfather sing the hymns he loved. My least favorite memories were of Mr. Davis's Pastoral Prayers which seemed to a child as though they would never end.

Grampa Wilcox was a Deacon and, as his window on the east wall attests, he was Sunday School Superintendent here for 15 years. Sunday School was very important to Grampa, and if we drove down from East Providence to their house for Sunday dinner, his first question to my sister and me was, "Did you girls go to Sunday School today?" My mother worshipped her father and made sure we could always tell him we had indeed gone to Sunday School that morning. We went, mostly without complaint, because we knew it was important to Grampa, whom we loved.

In its original location, Hope Congregational was less than two blocks away from my home. That made it easy for my mother to just send us to Sunday School, as she and my dad never went to church unless my sister and I were doing something special in Sunday School or church. My dad was raised as a Catholic and my mother was the only daughter-in-law to marry into his family who refused to convert. Whether their refusal to attend church was a sort of truce between them or whether it was the tragic loss of my older sister that caused a loss of faith, I never asked.

By the time I was in junior high school, I was teaching Sunday School at

Hope Congregational, and I continued to do that through college, as I was a day student and lived at home. I've joked with Bill that because I was mostly in Sunday School, my religious education is stuck at the Bible stories of Jesus stage. I completely missed the "doctrine" part of Christian education.

By the time I married and moved to Tiverton in 1960, my grandfather had died. My husband had grown up at Amicable and although he boasted about his Sunday School attendance pins, which some of you may remember, he did not attend church, so I did not, except for the day in 1961 when my membership was transferred from Hope Church to Amicable Church.

It was only when my daughter started to attend Vacation Bible School and then Sunday School that I began to get involved at Amicable. Soon after, Slade Innis, our minister for many years, retired and Joe Runner became our new minister. As I recall, the structure of the church boards and officers were reorganized at that time. If I'm not mistaken, all the Deacons and Trustees had previously been men. Wardwell Leonard asked me to be part of the new Christian Education Committee and a few years later I was asked to be one of the first female Deacons. I have never been a "joiner", but I felt I could not refuse Mr. Leonard's request. As he pointed out, I would be following family tradition. Since then, I have accepted nearly every request for service. My comfort level would have led me to stay at home and let someone else do what needed to be done, but it has only been through service that I have come to know most of the wonderful people here at Amicable. It is the love I have received here that makes it comfortable for me to reach out to others.

Like most churches, Amicable has changed over the years. It feels very different to me from the church I remember from my grandparents' days. We have had several ministers since the Amicable of the 1950's ... some we have endured and others we have enjoyed, but I am ever grateful that we have had Bill Sterrett to continue to guide us through the important changes that have made Amicable the welcoming place it is today.

I would encourage anyone who wants to know more about our church family to become involved by participating. If, by some unlikely accident, no one has asked you yet, please volunteer in whatever capacity you feel comfortable. For that matter, stretch a little and try something. You will be the beneficiary.

I will continue to support Amicable Church in every way I can, as much as I can, for as long as I am able.

Worship Themes

January 5 Rev. Dr. Charles Simonson will be leading worship while Rev. Sterrett is away. The scripture focus will be: Jeremiah 3:7-14 and John 1:10-18. Sermon Title is “The long reach of God's Love”

January 12 Epiphany, January 6, is when the church celebrates the arrival of the magi and the recognition of who the baby Jesus really is. This first Sunday after Epiphany is traditionally the Baptism of Christ Sunday, where the adult Jesus is anointed by water and the Holy Spirit. In the book of Acts is recorded a sermon by the Apostle Peter (Acts 10:34-43), in which Peter tells us why Jesus is important: Jesus revealing, God revealed. In worship we will examine what this “revealing” has to do with us.

January 19 This Sunday falls on Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday weekend. Guided by the prophet Isaiah (Isaiah 49:1-7) we will focus on the legacy of Dr. King’s ministry and what it means to be “chosen by God” and “a light to all nations.”

January 26 On this Sunday, when we will be welcoming new members into our fellowship, we can join in celebrating as Isaiah (Isaiah 9:1-4) did, when God “multiplied the nation ... [and] increased its joy.” (vs. 4a) Also, appropriately, the Gospel reading (Matthew 4:12-23) is about Jesus calling disciples and going about his ministry with them. In addition to welcoming new members we will also kick off our annual Food Drive. We are asking those coming to worship to bring non-perishable food items to share with those in our community who are hungry.

Inquirers' Class



Homeless Awareness Mission Project

With the conclusion of our Thanksgiving Basket Project in November, Amicable turns its focus to growing our awareness of homelessness and helping to ease the pain of those homeless in our community. Our Homeless Awareness Mission Project officially began on Mitten Tree Sunday (last December 8th) and will continue with a variety of activities through March.

Here are some of the things that are happening, and will happen, in the coming months.

First Step Inn

The First Step Inn is a program providing safe shelter and daily nutritional meals to at least 20 homeless persons in the City of Fall River daily. Case Management services provided at the Inn connect guests to housing, employment, entitlements, behavioral health, and an array of other services. These services, provided in a safe, comfortable environment, help homeless persons become housed in stable, permanent housing. Guests

become engaged in all supportive services needed and as a result, successfully transition into the community and experience housing stability and an improved quality of life.

The mittens, gloves, scarves, and hats we brought to church on Mitten Tree Sunday, December 8th, went to First Step Inn, who will share these gifts of warmth with their guests.

Food Drive

Our annual food drive will be from January 26 – Monday, February 10. We will kick off the drive in our Sunday morning worship service, to which all are invited to bring non-perishable food items to share with those in our community who are food insecure. Our community-wide food drive will end on Monday, February 10. All donated food items will be shared with the food pantries at East Bay Community Action Project (EBCAP) on Stafford Rd. and Old Stone/First Baptist Church.

Homeless Awareness Overnight

The youth group's night in the cold to raise their awareness of the physical effects of homelessness has grown over the years into a weekend of awareness for the church and community. This year's overnight (our 20th) begins at 7:00 PM on Saturday, February 1. The youth will be raising funds for First Step Inn through sponsorships. We are working to have someone from First Step Inn Saturday evening speak with the youth around the burn barrel, as they try to keep warm.

Homeless Health Kits

During the month of March we will be collecting a variety of items needed for a Homeless Health Kit. A Homeless Health Kit consists of items a person needs, but cannot afford or cannot be bought with the help of food stamps. Below you will find a list of the items we are hoping to collect and put into a bag that is easy to carry around. These items can be found at low cost at Ocean State Job Lot, Dollar stores, or Christmas Tree Shops.

Sunday, March 29th, we want to put together **60 Health Kits**, which means we need at least **60 of each item** listed below:

Ways to Contribute: Pledging vs. Using Envelopes vs. Loose Collections

Amicable's members and friends can contribute financially in many ways; and in general, as well as to specific purposes (e.g. Operations, Benevolence, Christian Ed, an Endowment Fund, in Memoriam, an Honorarium, an established project such as Haiti Project or Accessibility Project, etc.).

Pledging:

- Allows members/friends to indicate your planned contributions for the year in support of covering Operation and/or Benevolence expenses.
- Indicates frequency & amount of pledge (e.g. \$x weekly to Operations and/or \$x monthly to Benevolence).
- Provides income data to Treasurer, Trustees, & Deacons to better help them manage finances for the year.
- Is not a formal commitment but an indication of intent, so there is no official balance owed if the planned total (e.g. \$10 wkly = \$520 for the year, or \$200 mthly = \$2400 for the year) is not achieved by year-end.
- If a Pledger finds out during the year that they will not be able to meet their intended pledge, they may change their pledge (just inform the Treasurer – this helps with church financial management).
- Pledgers use numbered envelopes or checks so that the Treasurer can keep track of their contributions in order to provide status vs. your pledge.
- The Treasurer will provide the status of a Pledger's contributions vs. their pledge periodically during the year. The current plan is to provide this status quarterly, i.e. at the end of March, June and September. (E.g. "Your contributions through March (25% of the year) represent about 24% of your year's pledge.") The plan is to provide this status via email whenever possible. If a Pledger doesn't want this periodic status, wants it more frequently, or wants a special status or detailed accounting at some point during the year, just let the Treasurer know.

Contributing & Using Numbered Envelopes:

- Members/friends can certainly contribute without having to pledge.
- The use of numbered envelopes or checks by Contributors, even if you do not pledge, allows the Treasurer to keep track of your contributions in order to provide you with year-end records & tax-deductible info.
- If you would like to have a box of numbered envelopes, just ask the Treasurer or Church Office.

Loose Collections:

- This refers to cash that members/friends place in the Sunday offering plates without using numbered envelopes or checks.

Year-End Contribution Forms:

- The Treasurer will provide each known contributor (i.e. Pledgers and Contributors who use numbered envelopes or checks) with the specific status of the designations and total amounts of your contributions at year-end for tax deductibility purposes.
- All Pledgers, as well as those Contributors with at least \$250 in total contributions for the year, will be provided a form, although a form can certainly be requested by any known contributor.
- The goal is to provide these contribution forms by January 21st. IRS regulations state that a contributor should have all appropriate proof of contributions prior to declaring those on Federal Tax Forms.

Annual Giving Opportunities for our Mission Work

- January** – on the first Sunday of each month the donations put in the plate at Coffee Hour go to support Holy Joe's Cafe.
- February** – sponsor a youth participating in Homeless Awareness Weekend overnight on first Saturday of February. Also, Super Bowl Grinders are a youth group fundraiser.
- March** – One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) offering envelopes: This is an all-church United Church of Christ annual offering supporting international mission projects and disaster relief; also there is a calendar and coin box to raise awareness of the abundance we have with the money raised given to OGHS.
- April** – Easter Offering envelopes: Giving from this offering is used to support Amicable's Benevolence Budget.
- May** – Each year the youth go on a summer mission trip. Often the congregation is asked to donate to support this important youth activity.
- June** – Summer Festival: This is an opportunity to donate items and goods, as well as giving of time and talent, in support of our annual fundraiser (it is also a chance to spend money on items like Silent Auction items, books, plants, food, etc.)
- September** –the beginning of a new Sunday School year brings a new mission project the Sunday School as a whole will be working on, with the help and support of the members and friends of Amicable Church
- October** – Neighbors in Need: This is an all-church United Church of Christ annual offering supporting national (USA) mission projects, with a third of the moneys raised supporting our denomination's extensive ministries with Native Americans.
- Pledge Drive: this is when the members and friends of Amicable Church are asked to consider what they will be giving in the coming year in support of our Operation and Benevolence Budgets
- November** – Thanksgiving Baskets: beginning in the fall, but culminating on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, members and friends will be asked to share food items as well as financial support in order to provide food baskets to residents in the greater Tiverton community. (In 2019 we provided over 140 Thanksgiving Baskets and served over 750 people.)
- December** – Christmas Offering envelopes: Giving from this offering is used to support Amicable's Benevolence Budget.
- Holiday Bazaar: Our second major fundraiser, where you are asked to bake cookies, pies, and cakes, make wreathes, knit and donate items for our holiday gift sale.
- During the holiday season some give to support Tiverton Emergency Assistance Mission (T.E.A.M.)
