## Homelessness Awareness Project



The youth group's night in the cold to raise their awareness of the physical effects of homelessness has grown over the years into a three-month-long homeless awareness focus for our church and community. As we did last year, we chose to give our support to First Step Inn, a homeless shelter in Fall River. First Step Inn seeks to serve the homeless in the greater Fall River community by being the first-step toward permanent housing.

Due to your generosity, as well as the generosity of the greater Tiverton community, we gave First Step Inn three large bags of new mittens, gloves, hats, and scarves in December. The moneys raised by our youth will support our Homeless Health Bags, for which in March we will be collecting items (see the article in this month's newsletter). Our plan is to put together, again, 60 health kits, half of which we will give to First Step Inn and the other half members and friends of Amicable will distribute on their travels around town. Any leftover financial donations for this project will be given to First Step Inn.

To all the members and friends of Amicable Church, who have made our Homeless Awareness Project such a success, we say, "THANK YOU!"

## Pastoral Letter

*“And when they could not bring him to Jesus because of the crowd, they removed the roof above him; and after having dug through it, they let down the mat on which the paralytic lay. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, “Son, your sins are forgiven.”*

This year our Lenten sermon series, Living a Just Peace Life, will be focusing on many of the justice commitments of our newly formed Southern New England UCC Conference; justice commitments that Amicable’s leadership says are Amicable’s commitments as well. For some of these justice issues our focus will be on going deeper into an issue we at Amicable Church are already trying to live into. For others our focus will be on laying the groundwork for going deeper into the issue in the future. I believe this sermon series is the most important series of my ministry here at Amicable Church, because I am convinced that Amicable Church’s future is dependent on our ability to educate ourselves about, and then to live into, these very important justice commitments.

In this letter I just want to focus on Accessible to All, known in the UCC as A2A. I put this first originally, because I felt it didn’t really feel like a justice issue to me at the time and easy to deal with, because we have already, at great expense of time and treasure, made our building accessible. *(We have done it, but we still have a large mortgage to go with it. This is an unashamed plug to anyone who would like to help us pay down our mortgage.)*

Yet, the more I pondered the justice issues we will be looking at this Lenten

season, the more I came to understand the true depth and breadth of A2A and why it is a justice issue. Making our building accessible to all is of vital importance. Whose faith is so large that they are willing to find a crane to raise someone up to the roof just to get into the building?

Making our building physically accessible to all is the outward sign that we want everyone to feel invited and welcomed into our church building and our community of faith. And, having a building be physically accessible is vital, if we want people to hear the good news of God's love. But, in truth, an accessible building is only the beginning of an A2A congregation. Wanting any, and all, to have access we have to make them feel seen and welcome. Here at Amicable we pride ourselves on being a welcoming congregation. But, are we?

When someone in a wheelchair comes to worship, where do they "park" their transport? At the back of the sanctuary? Or down in front, the center of everyone's attention? Wouldn't it be a warmer welcome to cut out part of a couple of our pews so someone in a wheelchair can sit in the middle, surrounded and cared for by the whole worshipping body?

Even with this example, we are still taking about the physical aspects of accessibility, about "hearing" the good news. The paralyzed man, carried in by friends, would not have experienced the good news of God's love, if Jesus had not noticed him, welcomed him, and offered him encouraging words of support, which healed him. The good news of God's love has to be more than heard, it has to be experienced.

A2A is more than just about physical accessibility. A2A is a challenge to welcome into one's community those who are different. Welcome implies more than offering a cup of coffee and a cookie. It is a wanting to get to know and understand a person; to affirm them in who they are, to learn about them, maybe even about their pain, and possibly help them to see who or what they might grow into, in and through God's love shared, flowing in and through us.

A2A is about openness; openness to understanding the injustices in our world and openness to people afflicted by an injustice. We become an A2A congregation, when we work at understanding the injustices that afflict so many people in our world, even if we are not affected by the injustice or think we are not the cause of a particular injustice. We work at understanding the injustices of this world by taking time to learn about the injustices, but, more importantly, by welcoming in and listening to the people who bear the brunt of an injustice. As we welcome them into our community and listen to their story, an understanding and a relationship can grow.

In this sense, A2A is the foundational justice issue. If we, as a congregation, are not A2A, then there is no possibility of us learning from those different from ourselves and without this relational learning there is no chance of becoming truly Open and Affirming, Welcoming of Immigrants, Racially and Culturally Aware, able to see and speak out about the Violence Against Women, or express a willingness to care for God's creation, truly the silent voice of despair.

## **A Lenten Sermon Series: Living a Just Peace Life**

Our newly formed Southern New England Conference UCC voted on November 2 in the affirmative about the Conference's justice commitments. (Elsewhere in this newsletter you will find the Foundational Justice Commitments statement of the Southern New England Conference.) Amicable's Church Council gave verb approval of these commitments, indicating they were Amicable's commitments as well. This year's Lenten journey will be a sharpening of our eyesight around these justice commitments. "Just Peace" is the theme of our 2020 Lenten journey. We opened our Lenten series a week early (on February 23) – appropriately Transfiguration Sunday, where we examined why Accessible to All (A2A) is a justice issue. Below, in our Worship Themes for March, are the remaining five justice commitments we will be examining.

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## Worship Themes

**March 1** First Sunday in Lent: **Open and Affirming** (with a focus on **Transgender** issues) Acts 10:9-35 This is the story of Peter's food vision and his being told to eat, even though he thought it was unclean. The vision leads Peter to state: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality."

Following worship there will be a workshop training to help people better understand gender identity led by Bente Sterrett (See information in article below)

**March 8** Second Sunday in Lent: **Immigrant Welcoming**. Matthew 2:13-15: The Escape to Egypt The hope is to put a face on immigrants and why they come. Many, maybe most, are not economically motivated, rather child-loving, child-protective motivated.

**March 15** Third Sunday in Lent: **Multi-Cultural, Multi-Racial**. Acts 17:26-27 and Galatians 3:28 Taking Paul's words about "from one ancestor God made all nations" (Acts) and "no Jew or Greek, no slave or free, no male or female" (Galatians) and carrying them out to their logical conclusion of inclusion: We are all one family; all kin to one another. Therefore, it is important for us to get to know, respect, and

accept each person as a child of God, a brother or sister. True respect requires us to be open to and embracing of our differences.

**March 22** Fourth Sunday in Lent: **Opposing Sexism & Violence Against Women.** Mark 5:25-34: A Woman Healed. The entire history of the church has been one of patriarchal violence against women. The woman, who feels she is not worthy of consideration by Jesus, has been bleeding – physically, emotionally, and spiritually, forever. Jesus’ welcome of women as equals and his healing of this woman is a condemnation of violence, hatred, and vilification of women

**March 29** Fifth Sunday in Lent: **Climate Justice.** Genesis 1:26-31 We will examine what “dominion” means, using God as our example. Do we love and care for those who have been entrusted to our care? Are we partners with all creation, as God is with us? Or, do we dominate, control, and use/abuse creation for our benefit, without regard for the benefit of future generations?

## **TRANS CULTURAL COMPETENCY TRAINING**

### **WORKSHOP DESCRIPTION:**

This workshop teaches the concepts, terminology, and cultural awareness to support transgender and gender non-conforming individuals, in particular youth. Participants will learn about gender identity development, the processes of coming out, transitioning, and navigating internalized oppression and trauma. The focus of the workshop will be on building skills to provide culturally competent support that is in the best interest of all gender-variant individuals.

### **SKILL-BUILDING GOALS:**

1. Improve personal understanding of the concept of gender. Participants will be able to understand how the concept of gender relates to their own personal identity and the identities of others.
2. Learn appropriate language, cultural-generational differences in language used, and psychological affects choice of language has on Transgender individuals.
3. Improve ability to pick up on micro aggressions and become more aware of our own, to minimize harm.
4. Learn special concerns related to this population and strategies to address them.

**Experience related to topic:** I have over 7 years of experience in various Human Service positions within Fall River, and now work in a clinical practice setting treating mental health conditions, including LGBTQ+ individuals. In the past I have also organized a presentation and panel discussion on LGBTQ for a community organization. I am in the process of becoming a certified Trans Gender Specialist.

This training has been presented to Mass Department Children and Families, the Fall River School Department, and various Fall River human service and counselling agencies.

## Foundational Justice Commitments

We believe that it is our call to “live the love and justice of Jesus.” Based on both the established commitments of our three historic Conferences and our aspirational priorities as a new Conference, the Southern New England Conference of the United Church of Christ, at its first Annual Meeting on November 2, 2019, pledges in covenant:

- To be an Open and Affirming Conference;
- To be a Just Peace Conference;
- To be an Accessible to All Conference;
- To be an Immigrant Welcoming Conference;
- To work for climate justice and the restoration of God’s creation on which all life depends;
- To advocate for economic and restorative justice;
- To be a multi-cultural multi-racial church working to eradicate racism in all of its forms, both within the church and in the structures of our society and world;
- To advance immigrant justice and human rights for all people;
- To oppose all forms of sexism and violence against women, especially women of color.

We recognize that these are expressions of both identity and intention, and we commit to align our resources and our efforts with these priorities. We encourage our local churches and other covenant partners to do the same.

It all began shortly after the end of World War Two when pictures of ruined cities in Europe and children picking through the rubble caused one American church to start the first offering to help with the rebuilding of lives there. 
**Jay Silvia**
